#### MESSAGE FROM ADRIAN

Did you know that the story of Cartrefi Cymru began in a pub just outside Ammanford in Carmarthenshire? Our first Chair, Ken Evans, lived nearby and he chose the venue for the very first Board meeting. Ken had a daughter with learning disabilities. There was another parent present, Sue Skillicorn, from Deiniolen in Gwynedd. The Rev. Randolph Thomas from Carmarthen was there. He was active in the housing sector. Also present was Rex Hewitt, Director of Mencap Cymru, and Pete Tyndall and Gerry Evans, both from a small pioneering charity called CUSS (Cardiff Universities Social Services). Pete went on to become the Human Rights Commissioner for Ireland, whilst Gerry became the Registrar of Social Care Wales. Those six people were our founders, and if it wasn't for their insight and energy, Cartrefi wouldn't exist. The year was 1989, and something called the All Wales

Strategy had been underway since 1983. The aim of the Strategy was to close down the big old institutions that were dotted around Wales, and to support people with learning disabilities to live in their own local homes. By 1988, people were being offered lovely new homes with respectful support in and around all the main cities and towns of Wales. But people from rural Wales and the Valleys were still stuck in the institutions. This was the insight of our founding trustees. They saw that Wales needed a new organisation with the right values and skills to serve rural Wales and the Valleys, and they set about creating it. As well as drawing up a constitution, and a Business Plan, they had to get funding from the Welsh Office and County Councils. Which explains why there were two other people present in that pub meeting. One was Colin Vyvyan from the Welsh Office (and later, All Wales People First) and the other was me.

I was working for CUSS at the time and my job involved encouraging Councils to work with this new thing called Cartrefi. Well done to those Councils for taking the plunge and buying us on spec. We didn't let them down. Within five years, Cartrefi was a massive success, and hundreds of people from rural Wales and the Valleys were living in decent homes of their own. And our commitment to individuality, community and respect has never wavered. Happy anniversary, everyone!





Staff are now eligible to apply for a Blue Light Card which entitles them to discounts in Shops, Restaurants, on Holidays, Insurance, Phone Contracts, Theme Parks and more.

There are grants available to carers working in Residential Social Care, Home Care, Supported Living and Day Care, and staff of any role working in a care setting may be eligible for support e.g. Care Staff, Domestic, Back Office and Catering staff.




#### WINTER IS COMING
